That's a lot to look forward to over the next few weeks! A lot of things to hope for! Which is funny because when we light the first candle of Advent, that's what we are doing: Hoping. Hoping for a good Christmas. Hoping for a relaxing few weeks. Hoping for things to go smoothly at all these things that are upcoming! Hoping that we don't forget anything. Waiting for the Birth a Jesus. We have a lot to be excited about, and a lot to prepare, and being Hopeful helps add to the excitement!

[If you haven't already, light the first candle of Advent here. If already done, continue to the prayer].

#### Reflections on the reading

So here we are in Advent. Again.

In the darkness longing for light. Again.

The world can seem like a dark place can't it?

[You may like to share some of the challenging stories that caught your attention from the news this week or invite the congregation to do so].

Perhaps there have been dark times in our own lives or in the lives of our loved ones? As we head into the Advent and Christmas season, we see much uncertainty around us, in the news, in our politics, in the world. And, of course, we see the darkness of the shorter-days and the longer-nights here in the UK. In our Gospel reading we read about Jesus predicting the end of the world - and the fear and uncertainty, the 'darkness' this might have brought to mind for the disciples might be felt by many in our world today.

The Christmas story reminds us that we are not alone when we experience darkness. Jesus suffered. Jesus understands our suffering and the suffering of a world that is often dark and still longing for light. That is what it means for God to be 'with us'. Immanuel.

Where do you see hope at work in today's lectionary readings? Isaiah was a great prophet of hope. There is much hope in the Psalms. Jesus brings hope to us all. But where do you notice hope? Why not turn to the person next to you and talk about that? [Give time for conversation]

Our hope is bigger than a sort of vague thinking that 'everything will work out', it is more a practice. Not the kind of hope that buys a lottery ticket and crosses its fingers but that deep Hebrew hope that holds onto and lives in line with what we believe will one day be – even if surrounded by so many signs to the contrary.

As Brian McClaren said recently: "We have to keep on working for signs of hope, even when don't see any yet. That's what real hope is."

Are you feeling hopeful this Advent? Are you able to commit to hope again?

But.

Here we are in Advent. Again. In the darkness longing for light. Again.

The world can seem like a dark place can't it? But isn't it always darkest before the dawn?

So, may we be strengthened in endurance and patience as people of a kin-dom of light that is not yet but will fully be.

May we speak, act and live in a way that celebrates the light of love, justice and peace where it is to be found and offer that light where it is not. Until that kin-dom of light fully is. For all people. And all creation.

Amen.

[Prayer – you may like to invite people to a light a candle for the people and places of God's world. 'Run' by Snow Patrol or 'Within Our Darkest Night' from Taize may be appropriate pieces of music to use during this.

After giving people space to pray, and pausing in quiet, invite someone to read this poem and invite people to think about how they can keep enduring with Christ despite the darkness.]
