

Tim's Letter

Over the last couple of years I have spent a good deal of time reflecting on my own sense of discipleship, ministry and relationship with God. This has come about as a result of nearly six months off work due to ill health, bereavement and sabbatical. It was for me an experience of what the 16th century Spanish mystic St John of the Cross termed "the dark night of the soul." It was a prolonged period of self-examination and questioning around the theme "where is God in the midst of the difficulties we often face."

As I reflected on my own experience I also came to reflect upon the state of anxiety that much of our church life seems to be characterised by. The institutional Church in the Western world is in a period of sustained and rapid change as it seeks to find new ways of being and working in order to relate to today's world. And the prospect of change always leads to a degree of anxiety. How are we going to face that change as churches and as a Circuit? How are we going to live through the chaos of planning for growth at the same time as recognising the shrinking resources that seem to be available? When we can find no easy answers we are easily tempted to shrink back into ourselves and put up the barricades and our thinking and planning becomes more about "how long can we survive?" than "what can we do to thrive?" We narrow our focus to protecting ourselves and our egos.

A wilderness experience, such as a dark night of the soul, offers a different perspective. Lent, of course, marks Jesus' own wilderness experience. His period of fasting and temptation follows immediately on from the high of his identification as the Son of God through his baptism. So Jesus has to face the temptations of what his ministry and life would be about. Who's Kingdom would he seek to build.

Perhaps we can use this season of Lent to reflect upon our corporate challenges and instead of protecting our own little Kingdoms for as long as possible, we might throw ourselves and our churches on the mercy of God and trust that God will bring a new dawn out of the dark night, that chaos will in time lead to clarity as we let go of the need to control our own future.
