

# "The wedding feast: joy and judgement"

A service sheet to guide reflections on and around Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> October 2020

**Introduction** We continue our study of Matthew's gospel with the parable of the wedding feast.

## **Gathering prayer**

Lord God, faithful and loving, we do not always feel like rejoicing, even as we gather to worship you, for our minds are sometimes distracted and elsewhere; weighed down by the burdens of our lives.

Help us, in this moment, to find it within our hearts to rejoice in your constancy and abundance of care for us.

#### Bible Reading: Matthew 22 v 1-14

**22** Jesus again used parables in talking to the people. <sup>2</sup> "The Kingdom of heaven is like this. Once there was a king who prepared a wedding feast for his son. <sup>3</sup> He sent his servants to tell the invited guests to come to the feast, but they did not want to come. <sup>4</sup> So he sent other servants with this message for the guests: 'My feast is ready now; my steers and prize calves have been butchered, and everything is ready. Come to the wedding feast!' <sup>5</sup> But the invited

guests paid no attention and went about their business: one went to his farm, another to his store, <sup>6</sup> while others grabbed the servants, beat them, and killed them. <sup>7</sup> The king was very angry; so he sent his soldiers, who killed those murderers and burned down their city. <sup>8</sup> Then he called his servants and said to them, 'My wedding feast is ready, but the people I invited did not deserve it. <sup>9</sup> Now go to the main streets and invite to the feast as many people as you find.' <sup>10</sup> So the servants went out into the streets and gathered all the people they could find, good and bad alike; and the wedding hall was filled with people.

"The king went in to look at the guests and saw a man who was not wearing wedding clothes. 12 Friend, how did you get in here without wedding clothes?' the king asked him. But the man said nothing. 13 Then the king told the servants, 'Tie him up hand and foot, and throw him outside in the dark. There he will cry and gnash his teeth.'"

<sup>14</sup> And Jesus concluded, "Many are invited, but few are chosen."

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### Reflection Joy and judgement

At a wedding some time ago, the minister took the message of 'Blessings' for his address. Afterwards, he laid the wedding rings on the open Bible he was holding, to bless them. Suddenly he sneezed. In unison, the congregation responded in good nature with 'Bless you!' followed by a gasp of "Oh' as they realised the Bible shook and the rings had fallen. In this case all was well - more than well. The unexpected happening seemed to bring the congregation together. There was a connection, a sense of blessedness, with the people warming to the minister who was perhaps seen as human after all! It was such a small incident, yet it brought a shift. More than breaking the ice, it was a change in attitude and atmosphere. I'd call it a moment of joy, or a Kingdom moment. That spirit of joy was not present with the invited guests in this morning's story.

The tradition then was to announce the coming wedding celebration to the guests but not give a date. That would be left open until preparations were complete. Can you imagine that today? When the fatted calves had been killed, and all else was ready, the servants would call the invited guests. "Come. The feast is prepared."

Who would have imagined the guests would turn down an invitation from the king? The first guests did so with a casual indifference. The next servants to go out emphasised that prize calves were all prepared. But these guests made excuses – work to do, a farm to attend to. There's always something to distract from the call of the Kingdom. Our 'to do list' can be endless as well. A few of the guests took real offence and resorted to terrible violence, which escalated with the king's fury to further violence.

Here are two parables in one, both holding violence and judgement where we might expect simply joy. Parables are frequently written with exaggeration, with issues in stark black and white to stress the points. This one follows that pattern. It is only with interpretation the stories make sense for those times and for today.

The guests here represent the people of Israel who considered themselves the chosen people of God. The servants are God's messengers. But when Jesus came and called the Jews to follow him, they rejected him and his teaching. A second refusal came when Jesus welcomed both Jews and Gentiles to the Kingdom. The message was good news for all, but it wasn't seen that way.

In this story, the invited guests didn't join the wedding feast, not only on account of the king's judgement, but because the people had excluded themselves from his generosity.

And then the doors were opened wide – the invitation was to all. They came from the streets - the good, the bad, the poor, and the wealthy. What an unexpected delight!

Where are we today in this story, in the context of the pandemic, and the context of our corporate and individual lives of pleasures and pain?

Do we still hear his call?

Can we see it as a call to the Kingdom feast in spite of the challenges? Do we see Him perhaps in our struggling planet, the same planet he has so generously provided for us?

Do we see Him in a flimsy boat crossing the perilous waters of the Mediterranean, even though He has provided enough for all?

Will we be judged as much by what we've failed to do, than by the mistakes we've made?

The doors opened with joy! But the story doesn't quite end there. On arrival at the feast, one man is in the wrong clothes! There is joy - and judgement.

We might feel some compassion for this man, who at such short notice failed to observe the dress code. Most of us will have experienced a sense of embarrassment at some point when we've arrived at an event suddenly feeling overdressed, or underdressed! But the message here was much deeper than clothes. It was what they represented. He didn't have the clean clothes to signify a righteous spirit, and a sense of worthiness. It teaches us there's more to following Christ than saying 'Yes'. We are to live out our faith by following, mirroring Him through our attitudes, and our relationship with God and one another. Many are invited, but few are chosen.

And just a final word of instruction on our clothing (Colossians 3 v 12-14 from "The Message"): "So, chosen by God for this new life of love, dress in the wardrobe God has picked out for you - compassion, kindness, humility, quiet strength, discipline. Be even-tempered, content with second place, quick to forgive an offence. Forgive as quickly and completely as the Master forgave you. And, regardless of whatever else you put on, wear love. It's your basic, all purpose garment. Never be without it." Amen.
