"When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." Matt. 22: 34 - 40

Dear Friends,

The words above are taken from the Gospel reading in the Revised Common Lectionary for this coming Sunday. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind (some versions add 'and strength,')" and, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." Everything else depends on these Jesus tells us. Everything!

I wonder, how are you finding being able to love God with your whole being and to love your neighbour as yourself during this time of ever greater restriction, isolation, and fear? It's a massive challenge for us. It's hard enough just to keep the show on the road, to put one step in front of the other and keep going. Almost everywhere I look I see people drained of energy, joy and hope and I recognise my reflection in their faces (or more usually these days, in their computer screens!)

But while much has changed in our lives and in our world, God has not changed. God still pours himself out in love for this world. That is God's mission – to give himself for us and all our fellow human beings. And it is a mission that God calls us to participate in no matter what our context. Love for God is demonstrated through love for others.

Much of our world, and certainly media, is dominated by divisive voices, at present. But hope springs eternal and can be found in the most unlikely of places. If you know me well, you will know that not only am I a Leicester City fan, but I am also a Bon Jovi fan. Just in case you don't know who they are (!!!), they are one of the most successful rock bands of the last 40 years. I had the pleasure of seeing them live at Milton Keynes bowl in 1996 and have been hooked ever since. The lead singer, Jon Bon Jovi, has spent the last 6 months writing new songs for a new album with a social justice slant to it, and serving meals in the restaurants that are owned by his foundation, to those who cannot afford a proper meal. I want to share with you the lyrics of one of his new songs. You may even have heard it on the radio. It's called, "Do what you can."
