Who is this Jesus?

A service for 28th February 2021 2nd Sunday in Lent

Welcome and introduction. In today's service, for the 2nd Sunday in Lent, we continue to follow Christ in the early days of his teaching and preaching. Last week Chris Mannall led us on Jesus's baptism by John, a key event for Jesus and all who followed and follow him. This week we think about another key event, where Jesus for the first time talks about his path to the cross. We hear of Peter's reaction and Jesus's response. In all this we are thinking today about the question "who is this Jesus", both then and now.

A time of prayer

In our reading from Mark's Gospel Jesus is telling his disciples a difficult truth about what will happen to him, his rejection, death and resurrection, and through that who he really is. Peter finds it hard to take and argues with Jesus. Jesus sets out that God's ways are different from human nature: he says we must forget about our earthly desires and follow him to truly know him.

Reading - Mark 8.31-38

Jesus Speaks about His Suffering and Death

³¹ Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: "The Son of Man must suffer much and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the teachers of the Law. He will be put to death, but three days later he will rise to life." ³² He made this very clear to them. So Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³ But Jesus turned around, looked at his disciples, and rebuked Peter. "Get away from me, Satan," he said. "Your thoughts don't come from God but from human nature!"

³⁴ Then Jesus called the crowd and his disciples to him. "If any of you want to come with me," he told them, "you must forget yourself, carry your cross, and follow me. ³⁵ For if you want to save your own life, you will lose it; but if you lose your life for me and for the gospel, you will save it. ³⁶ Do you gain anything if you win the whole world but lose your life? Of course not! ³⁷ There is nothing you can give to regain your life. ³⁸ If you are ashamed of me and of my teaching in this godless and wicked day, then the Son of Man will be ashamed of you when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

Relection - Who is this Jesus? - is he any of these?



As we journey through Lent, a time of prayer and reflection, for some of abstinence, and for many, perhaps, repentance, turning around, taking their lives in a new direction, do we see Jesus, the "real" Jesus? We have heard in the last few weeks of how Jesus was seen by Peter at what is called the Transfiguration. We have heard of how he was seen by John at his baptism. Did these events allow Peter and John to answer the question, who is this Jesus, for themselves, to truly come to understand what knowing Jesus meant and would mean for them?

In today's passage, which follows immediately on from Jesus asking his disciples directly who they thought he was, he shows for the first time what the journey he and they are starting out on will mean. As we think on this perhaps, we might reflect on these questions –

- If we were asked by Jesus who we thought he was, what would we say?
- If we were told by Jesus of his coming suffering and death, as the disciples were, how would we react?
- What would we think of being likened to Satan?
- What would we think of being told we must forget ourselves and carry our cross to follow him?
- Can we see what Jesus means about gaining the whole world only to lose your life?

I invite you this week to think about these questions, to reflect on what they mean for you personally in your own Lenten journey. And perhaps as you do this next song might be of help.
