"Let the heavens rejoice, let the earth be glad; let the sea resound, and all that is in it. Let the fields be jubilant, and everything in them; let all the trees of the forest sing for joy. Let all creation rejoice before the Lord..." Psalm 96: 11-13a.

Dear Friends,

Last week I reflected briefly upon climate change and the challenge for our churches to become eco-congregations. As I prepare to lead worship this weekend, I am aware that this coming Monday marks the beginning of Christian Aid week. The theme this year is "climate chaos" and I shall be focussing upon that in my services this weekend as a way into living Christian Aid Week this year.

The verses quoted above from Psalm 96 are part of one of the suggested readings in Christian Aid's worship resources. They remind us that the whole of creation was created to sing God's praise and recognise God as its Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer. But when I read them, in the face of all that is going on in the world right now and all that humanity is doing to our environment, I find myself forced to ask, "How can the heavens rejoice, how can the earth be glad, how can the sea resound, how can the fields be jubilant, how can the trees sing for joy?"

The heavens are filled with greenhouse gasses and other pollutants that are not only making it difficult to breath but increasing the frequency and severity of tropical storms. Even space itself is now being littered with our junk! The earth is suffering the effects of climate change in ways that none of us have ever seen with increasingly extreme weather events and higher sea temperatures changing the landscape. The seas are filled with plastic, chocking the life out of the creatures that live in them and polluting our food chain. Deforestation is robing the trees of their joy and the precious eco-systems which are the basis for all life on earth. The rejoicing of the natural world that is meant to accompany the praise that we humans offer to our Creator is instead being replaced by lament.

It is fantastic that in some places the messages from the scientific community are beginning to break through and make a difference both to our own household, everyday lives, and to Governmental policy. But it is nowhere near enough, yet! The lobbying voices of companies and countries who are reliant on heavily-polluting technologies are still too loud and too powerful. They continue to drown out those voices of countries and communities who are suffering the worst effects of others' excess.

We Christians, recognising our job description as stewards of God's creation, must speak up for those who are not heard. We must act on behalf of a world which is being plundered of all the resources which enable us to live. We must encourage change, and protest where and when it is slow to come about. We must do what we can in our own lives to reduce, re-use, recycle. We have the power to make a difference. We can:

- Switch to green energy suppliers
- Reduce our use of plastic
- Turn our lights off when they don't need to be on
- Care well for our gardens and their other inhabitants
- As and when we are able, turn away from petrol and diesel cars
- Use our cars less and walk more, or make more use of public transport



- Insulate our houses properly
- Shop local
- Don't waste water
- Encourage our supermarkets to reduce plastic packaging and food waste
- Buy Fairtrade
- Pester our elected representatives to take climate change seriously from protecting the Greenbelt to increasing International Aid
- Live more simply
- And much, much more besides!

I hope and pray that you too will reflect on some of these issues over the coming week. It may be that some of our churches will have Christian Aid envelopes available for people to give to support the amazing work that they do.
