

KNOCKING ON THE DOOR

Dear Friends,

A new year is upon us, and it is one that feels at times as uncertain as the one that is passed. That doesn't overwhelm me, but it does make me cautious about what I anticipate and expect. Sometimes I sit back and think I have lost the last 18 months, and at other times I realise that they were not lost, they were just different. More recently I have started to consider them as an unexpected guest and in doing that I am drawn to one of the stories of Jesus, in a new way. The Message translation tells it this way:

"Imagine what would happen if you went to a friend in the middle of the night and said, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread. An old friend travelling through just showed up, and I don't have a thing on hand.'

The friend answers from his bed, 'Don't bother me. The door's locked; my children are all down for the night; I can't get up to give you anything.'

But let me tell you, even if he won't get up because he's a friend, if you stand your ground, knocking and waking all the neighbours, he'll finally get up and get you whatever you need."

An old way of reading the bible was to do it allegorically. This died out for several reasons - sometimes it just got plain weird in the hands of some ancient commentators, and then we thought a more scientific and rational approach was better. I want to go back for a moment to the weird and wonderful way if I may. What if we are the family tucked up in bed, and change is knocking at the door; change is there because people are not receiving the bread of life and we are one of the keepers of it.

Change (God?) has been knocking on the door of the Church for a long time, and if we are honest our response has not always been warm. Often, we have shouted in our polite Methodist ways from our metaphorical beds, "Awfully sorry, we're tucked up in bed and quite comfy. Off you go." The knock of change has become even more persistent this last 18 months and I wonder how have we been responding?

We have been disturbed from our beds; we have scrambled around, in the dark at first, finding what we had to share. Sometimes we didn't get our hands on the best bread first, but it at least responded to the immediate emergency. The last 18 months have been a disruption to us, but have they at the same time enabled us to recover our generosity, and also our awareness of the wider hunger and need for God in the world? Are we predisposed to get back in bed, or to get up and rethink how we are open to others?

When I look back on the last 18 months and consider them as an unexpected guest, I begin to wonder about the better ways that we have been prompted to embrace, rather than the more self-serving ways we had got used to.

I pose these questions for you to reflect on together:

How is change (God?) knocking on the door of your church? What is change asking of you, and who is it asking for?

What does your metaphorical bed look like? How are you comfortable in church and what would it take to get you out of bed?

How have the last 18 months caused you to rethink the purpose of your church and what you are called to be?

How has Covid disrupted you, and what was God saying to you in that disruption?

How is your church/circuit re-imagining life in a world that is living with Covid, and what does getting out of bed look like for you?



AROUND THE DISTRICT

CALDERDALE CIRCUIT

Here in the Calderdale Circuit, we offer a story of training future church leaders locally, and do so with grateful thanks to the Calderdale Circuit Meeting and Yorkshire West District for funding the project. It is just a snapshot of one of our many pieces of work.

Brighouse Central Methodist Church has designed and started running internships, becoming a kind of local church training hub. The aim is to develop leaders capable of fuelling growth. With one of the interns first coming to Brighouse as a ONE Programme participant, the church is looking towards establishing a pattern of leadership development and we seek to develop this focus through increasing circuit engagement.

The internships take an overtly Wesleyan approach to experiential education which has outcomes actively centred on God's mission in the world. The internship approach encourages study to become learning that can be applied and practised in a supervised programme. The experience suggests that the development and delivery of a well-planned internship, which focuses on identifying, equipping, and sending out lay leaders capable of leading an ecclesial community, cannot be overestimated in the present age.

The circuit is blessed with diversity and a depth of local church mission and leadership experience, which can be channelled into a guided internship format. Locating the internship in a safe and supportive environment is important, where the local congregation hold a commitment to equip the future shepherds of God's flock and understand their role in this process.

It has proved critical to the internship's success to construct a covenant group. Covenant group? Think Wesley's class meeting meets experiential learning theory and you won't be far off. The central role of the covenant group in the internships meant that it proved instructional to maintain the energy of the covenant group, including patterns of sustainable reflection. Not only the interns, but all the covenant group participants worked together in shared discipleship and leadership formation.

The growth for each intern showed that there is no substitute for practice or real-life application. The internships worked well, allowing for relevant, consistent theological reflection and they succeeded in identifying strengths related to discernment, calling, learning and leadership. It is also important to plan well for the steps that follow the conclusion of the internship.

The Biblical foundation for the covenant group was taken from the ideas of presence, commissioning and sending in relation to *John 20.19b-23*. There we can see a dynamic necessity of community which is integral to the formation of the student learner/intern/disciple.

Do internships work? The honest answer is yes! One intern is now part of the team planting a student church in Leeds and the other is now a Christian singer/songwriter capable of serving as a worship pastor. As you read this, another two interns are likely to have begun their journey on the programme.

SETTLE CIRCUIT

As our churches begin to fully open again, a lot of new initiatives are starting to take shape.

St. John's, Settle, has recently formed a 'Climate Group' to build on its work and success in achieving an ecoChurch award and is raising awareness throughout the circuit with Climate Sunday services now planned in all of our chapels. St. John's is pushing forward towards its 'Silver' award, having recently completed a large cladding and insulation project on the church hall.

Hellifield Chapel is beginning a number of new initiatives supporting families and children, including Hellitots, Hellikids and Hellibabies! At the other end of the age range, a new weekly drop-in will help support the elderly and vulnerable. Hellifield Chapel will celebrate its Harvest Festival on 5th September this year with an open-air service on the Station platform, located at the southern end of the Settle - Carlisle railway, the building of which was the reason for the chapel's founding! The service will feature traditional Harvest hymns played by the Giggleswick and Settle Brass Band, and all are welcome to come along.

Commencing this October, Settle Church will be playing host to new PeerTalk groups, designed to help and support those for whom life can be overwhelming. This will be an important piece of support for the rural community. Meanwhile the church is also supporting an initiative for Settle to become a Dementia Friendly town, working with, and hosting, various groups to raise awareness of the issues faced by those living with dementia, and their carers, and to facilitate volunteers and training. In a busy time for the church the vaccination centre, begun in March this year, is also continuing through the Autumn, in association with Ingleton Pharmacy, providing a vital local facility to the community in Settle and the surrounding area. Each of these initiatives is intended to help the church make a deeper connection with the community in which we sit, carrying the good news in practical as well as spiritual ways.

Bentham, Burton and Newby churches are developing their strong links with local Anglican churches. Burton is currently meeting in the Parish Church during work on their premises, while Bentham is hosting the local Church of England congregation while work takes place in the Parish Church. There are plans for an Anglican baptism in Bentham Methodist Church and a Methodist baptism in Burton Parish Church! Newby is also working closely with neighbouring parishes, with a planned Forest Sunday and a series of Studies based on the book 'Jesus and the Earth'. Bentham is also hosting walkers from London to Glasgow for the COP26 Climate Conference.

DENBY DALE & CLAYTON WEST CIRCUIT

Congregations in Denby Dale & Clayton West are increasingly engaged with Green Church. The Climate Change Crisis confronts humanity across the globe and it's pleasing to see our churches seeking to obtain Eco Church (A Rocha) awards to indicate their common commitment to addressing Climate Change. Many of our churches now purchase their electricity and gas from providers like Pure Planet; we try to make sure that worship includes regular prayers for God's created order as it is damaged by human activity; we are beginning to hold outdoor worship events that locate us close to the natural world as we praise the One who made it. Several of our members were involved in hosting and attending the successful Climate Change Conference organised by JPIT Yorkshire in June. This has further inspired: activism towards COP 26 – we are starting a Craftivism group in the summer; and personal lifestyle changes that see us trying to reduce our own carbon footprints.

Our ministry with schools has inevitably been a little hesitant during lockdown, but we look to break out of that in the Autumn term and in the run up to Christmas. We have two walking nativities planned with different schools and their communities and are looking forward to beginning assemblies again with the seven schools we go into. It will be good to engage face to face with the children and teachers again after all the video work we did in the run up to Christmas last year using our home-grown resources around the *Jesse Tree*.

We continue to thank God for the work of the Denby Dale Centre, which was initiated by congregations some 15 years ago but is now a charity in its own right, with continued input from church members who make up the larger proportion of trustees on the board. The Denby Dale Centre has featured well in Government publications in recent years and has received visits from Government ministers to observe and celebrate its work. Our Chief Officer, Paul Jones, a member at Lindley Methodist Church in Huddersfield Circuit, received an MBE for his work during the pandemic as he worked with the Local Authority in addressing local need.

We give thanks and praise to the God who moves among us in Spirit and to Christ Jesus who draws us on to new opportunities for ministry and mission. We give thanks for our unity in Christ as we invest ourselves purposefully in the Kingdom of God.


WHARFEDALE & AIREBOROUGH CIRCUIT

“Letting Go and Letting God”

The Church Council of Otley Methodist Church has recently taken the very difficult decision to seek permission to sell their premises. The building is Grade II listed and dates from the 1870's. It was originally built to seat many hundreds of worshippers. It is a very formal building which is extremely expensive to maintain and the sanctuary itself does not lend itself to a more flexible or contemporary approach to worship.

Whilst there is great sadness involved in making this decision, both the church council and the congregation are firm in their belief that this is not the end of the road for the Methodist presence and mission in Otley and are actively seeking to discern the new future that God is leading them in to. We believe there is a good and appropriate future use for the premises but also a good future for the congregation away from it. At this point we are keeping our options open and exploring ecumenical conversations, other appropriate premises in the town and keeping an eye on the possible development of a new housing estate on the edge of the town. Each of these provides opportunities for different avenues of ministry and mission and we are working with the Circuit Leadership Team to discern the right sort of ministerial appointment to help lead the transition of what had become a tired congregation in a tired building to something new, vibrant and full of possibility!

Which church do you attend?:


